Minutes of August 20, 2014

Sierraville School
Sierraville, CA

The August 20, 2014 meeting of the Board of Supervisors' Committee on Economic and Business Development was called to order by Chairman Huebner at 10:00 a.m. at the Sierraville School, Sierraville, California.

1. **Roll Call**

Members Present: Beard; Breed; Dobija; Huebner; Wagner; Whitley; Williams; Yegge

Members Absent: Christian; Clark; Hall; Payen

Staff Present: Tim Beals, Planning Director; Miriam Dines, Office Manager

Guests: Zachi Anderson, Forest Trails Alliance; Brooks Mitchell, Mayor, City of Loyalton; Scott Schlefstein, Supervisor District 5

Chairman Huebner announced a field trip at 11:00 a.m. with the Fire Safe Council, the Sierra Business Council and Mr. Munson at the co-gen plant in Loyalton. Randy Wagner confirmed the meeting and also highly recommended members to attend the August 25, 2014 meeting of the El Dorado County Board of Supervisors in Placerville. Apparently there will be a number of presentations on bio-mass, water, and related issues and we should see if there is any information presented that we might want to leverage.

2. **Approval of Agenda:** Don Yegge moved to approve the agenda; Patricia Whitley seconded. Motion approved unanimously by acclamation.

3. **Approval of Minutes:** Patricia Whitley moved to approve the minutes as presented; Don Yegge seconded. Motion approved unanimously by acclamation.

4. **Committee Members' Reports:** No committee reports were given.

5. **Public Comment:** Brooks Mitchell, Mayor, City of Loyalton reported that the School District solicited bids for the purchase of the old middle school building with the minimum bid being \$25,001. They didn't receive any bids, and Mr. Mitchell checked with the district after the bid date and they indicated that the City could still submit a sealed bid. The City has put in a sealed bid. If they end up owning the school building they will plan to relocate the museum as well as agricultural implements to that lot.

6. Workshops-Presentations-Discussions

- 6a) Follow-up on Downieville Classic and further discussion on possibility of World Cup mountain bike event in 2016: Greg Williams reported that the Downieville Classic went smoothly, that it was their best year ever. There were just shy of 900 racers hailing from as far away as South Africa, Italy, Scotland and Canada. Next year is the 20th anniversary of the Downieville Classic.

Mr. Williams reported that the Director of the Enduro World Cup and his wife attended the Downieville Classic and enjoyed themselves. They are interested in pursuing permits to put on a World Cup event in Downieville in 2016. Ranger Hayden is supported but they would like to get County buy-in before moving forward. There would be significant amount of work to be done on the trail system and a method to get the crews out there working needs to be identified; parking is also a big issue. In years past for the Classic they were able to use the Downieville Ranger Station, and the District Ranger is cooperative with the County which is refreshing. Mr. Williams will be addressing the Board of Supervisors at the first meeting in September, hoping to garner a resolution of support. He will be presenting a basic operating plan to the Board.

- 6b) Update from Zach Anderson of the Forest Trails Alliance regarding the development of the Mexican Mine Trail connecting Forest City to Downieville and related project: Mr. Anderson introduced himself stating that it was his first time to visit this group. He, too, noted that he is enjoying the new attitude from the USFS.

A brief overview of the USFS management of Forest City with history and recreation being the focus. In the years since he has been working with the USFS over 70 miles of trail have been developed and the area is being more well known. Three years ago the Forest Trails Alliance entered into a project plan with the USFS to work on a capital project, the Mexican Mine Trail, which is part of a broader plan to create more connectivity to Sierra County, ultimately creating a corridor to Downieville .

The Forest Trails Alliance is a non-profit similar to the Sierra Buttes Trail Stewardship with a commitment to building better trails, developing skill sets for the employees who work on the projects and providing training opportunities for volunteers and staff. They are bring revenues into the regions that they are trying to improve. They have a goal to develop a more effective partnership with Sierra County to create diverse and attractive recreational opportunities. The focus on the Alliance's trails is beginner to intermediate skill, where the SBTS is more extreme. They are hoping to take advantage of the terrain on the Pliocene Ridge and continue to develop an expanding trail system, potentially developing alternative markets like hut systems which are popular in other counties. With regard to the Mexican Mine Trail they are planning to develop a restroom in Forest City and with that are looking for support from the Environmental Health Department and the Building Department, and would like the County to invest by committing to pumping the toilet twice a year. The staging area needs site improvements including asphalt and striping and they are hoping for County assistance with that aspect as well. Mr. Anderson is requesting a 3 party meetings which includes the Forest Trails Alliance, Sierra County, and the USFS to collaborate and affirm support for the project. The other issue of concern raised is the incredible fuel load surrounding Forest City and would therefore want to work on installation of water lines and possible undergrounding of power lines in Forest City. He questioned the current status of PG&E funds that are allocated for burying infrastructure in historical places.

Funding options were briefly touched on including Recreational Trail Project funds and State Transportation Improvement Program funds (future years).

There was brief discussion touching on snow recreation opportunities in the Pliocene Ridge Area as well as the concept of opening the Truckee Ditch Trail which would essentially be as easy as brush removal.

The discussion veered to how the County is dealing with recreational "impact", which Mr. Beals noted is synonymous with "opportunity." A history of attempts to obtain funding for an Economic Development Coordinator was discussed, noting that funding agencies want projects, not employees.

- 6c) Update from City of Loyalton on bike path development: Mayor Brooks Mitchell thanked the Committee for placing the item on the agenda. He stated that what the City is looking for is to be identified as the trailhead for the Boca Loyalton bike trail. The City has developed a route through Loyalton that visits houses including the City barn which is the old depot building and 5 houses from the Lewis family and the old Masonic Hall and historical memorabilia of the Boca Loyalton Railroad. Each location will have a local historical designation along with a monument stating why it is significant. They would like to connect to the Sierra Brooks Trail which is a project that the Sierra County Transportation Commission has commenced.

In a brief discussion of how to get the designation Mr. Williams suggested putting that identifier on Facebook. The Sierra County bike path project was discussed briefly, and Mr. Beals reported on the formation of a project committee for the project.

- 6d) Discussion regarding short to immediate and long range access to broadband service: Mr. Wagner suggests that we should have Bob Marshall or another representative from Plumas-Sierra attend this meeting regularly. The County's needs for broadband need to be clearly identified, and it would be good to have knowledge of what Plumas Sierra's implementation plan is. Mr. Wagner suggests that we need to find out their plan and then determine if it will suffice, and if it won't what is to be done.

Mr. Wagner also announced a new emergency services organization who's first meeting was at Clear Lake. They produced a 60 page document, which should be reviewed, as it might provide a Plan "B" for broadband.

- 6e) Discussion regarding possible development of an Economic & Business Development Plan: Mr. Wagner discusses 3 communities of which Sierra County is one, who are aspiring to develop an Economic & Business Development Plan. He has committed to helping Auburn in their effort, they had their first kick-off meeting on Monday night. He could potentially make Sierra County the same offer for assistance but wouldn't be able to do that until after the first of the year.

- 6f) Open discussion on economic and business development: The Rural Business Opportunity Grant (RBOG) was revisited with a brief discussion. Mr. Beals believes that the County needs an in house position for Economic Development Coordinator. Mr. Wagner agrees, stating that in the evolving of different Counties' economies, the ones that are doing better are the ones with an in house position. It was acknowledged that most grant funders don't want to give money if you have no way to sustain the project. What needs to be done is to create more revenue for the county then use that revenue to staff.

Mr. Wagner suggested development of a short term to intermediate strategy and plan with regard to Economic Development, and the looking for the next RBOG window opening and perhaps applying for funding that is relative to an element of the Plan . On the grant preparation side of such a project it is possible that staff from SEDCorp would be able to assist with the development of an application.

USA Cycling the national governing body for the sport of competitive cycling is excited to partner with North Lake Tahoe CVB and the communities of North Lake Tahoe on the Elite/Amateur National Championships. This event draws cyclist from 10 years of age to 50 years of age from all over the country to compete in three separate disciplines that include the Road Race, Time Trial, and Criterium.





Due to this being a National Championship Event for Road Cycling we traditionally see athletes arrive early to preview courses and acclimatize to the local elevation/conditions.

The average stay for the athlete and their families in the past 6 years of the event has been 6-7 nights within the area. This includes 2-3 days for course review and acclimatization and 4-5 days of racing.

Racers from all 50 states will be in attendance this year.

In 2009 and 2010 Bend, Oregon hosted the event and in 2011 and 2012 Augusta, Georgia did as well. Both communities conducted economic impact studies during the event to measure how this event positively impacted their community.



Bend, Oregon

2009-2010

- Elite/Amateur National Championships generated an impact of \$1.44 million in direct tourist spending each year.
- A total of 2,840 people visited Bend specifically for the National Championships and stayed in the area for an average of 6.9 nights resulting in 19,600 “tourist nights”.
- In terms of geographic origin the National Championships were attended by visitors from all 50 U.S. states with only 5% of the attendees coming from within the state of Oregon.
- The National Championships generated a total of 3,500 paid lodging nights during the event. 83% of all respondents lodged within the city limits of Bend, 13% from the nearby Sunriver Resort Community, and 4% from other outlying areas.
- On a percentage basis, people who visited Bend for the National Championships were twice as likely as Americans as a whole to have household incomes of \$100,000 to \$199,000 range and they were four times as likely to have household incomes in the over \$200,000 range.

2011-2012

- Elite/Amateur National Championships generated an impact of \$1.2 million in tourist spending each year.
- A total of 1,928 people visited Augusta.
- In terms of geographic origin the National Championships were attended by visitors from all 50 U.S. states with only 1.4% of the attendees living locally.
- The National Championships generated a total of 2,700 paid lodging nights during the event.

To leverage the recently completed mid-mile fiber network for which Plumas-Sierra Telecommunications was awarded ARRA and CASF funds, PST is now applying for additional CASF funding to deploy a last-mile broadband network. The last-mile network will use wired and wireless technology interconnected with PST's mid-mile fiber network to offer service to 4,394 households in Plumas, Sierra and Lassen counties. Service offerings will include speeds starting at 10Mbps down/5Mbps up and include 75Mbps down/10 Mbps up.



PST Plumas/Sierra/Lassen Last-Mile Broadband Project




